



School of Social Science Undergraduate Field Trip – Solomon Islands July 2020

EOI Extended to 17 February 2020

Academics from the School of Social Science will lead a field trip to Solomon Islands for 20 students from 6 – 20 July 2020* funded by the [Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade's New Colombo Plan Mobility Projects](#). This is the first time a group of undergraduate students from the School of Social Science will have the opportunity to study in Solomon Islands, and to gain credit from this experience towards your undergraduate degree program.

The Program

The purpose of this program is to immerse students in a field study focused on the environmental and social challenges facing Solomon Islands, and to learn firsthand about innovative and resilient local level responses to these challenges. By joining this program, you will have the opportunity to be part of a student group that will embark on a unique transformative learning experience via exposure to multiple perspectives on environmental and social issues in the Pacific context. You will gain new knowledge and understanding on effective governance, responses to climate change, women's involvement in environmental management, and sustainable local livelihoods, amongst other themes and issues.

As part of this experience, you will travel with a group of up to 20 UQ students, and you will be supported in-country by two UQ academics with long term research experience in Solomon Islands, as well as a number of in-country organisations who will host us during our visit. All this will provide the basis for a rich and meaningful experience, with outcomes that will include your development of new competencies to work effectively in diverse teams, and in cross cultural environments.

The trip will consist of a range of activities in the capital Honiara, as well as in Choiseul Province, where we will be investigating the social political and environmental impacts of climate change prevention and mitigation in a Pacific micro-state. By staying in villages for most of the trip, you will be directly engaged as a participant observer, as well as attending workshops and meetings to enhance your learning. You will also have the opportunity to practice your research skills.

Who Can Apply?

This activity is designed for students taking a major in the social sciences. The field trip is offered as an elective* (#2 Units) which will consist of: (1) a range of preparatory activities (including cross cultural training, as well as curriculum related to Australia/Pacific relations, environmental and resource governance and climate change in the Pacific); (2) 2 weeks in the field; and (3) assessed written and oral work on return to Australia. The field trip will be conducted in July 2020, and students will be expected to engage in preparatory work in the 2 weeks leading up to the field trip, and to complete assessment within 6 weeks of returning to Australia.

To apply for this opportunity, you must meet the following DFAT grant conditions:

1. Be an Australian citizen with an Australian passport;



2. Not a citizen of, and does not have residency rights for, Solomon Islands;
3. Enrolled in an on-shore campus of an Australian University for the duration of the Mobility Project;
4. Undertaking a Bachelor Degree or Bachelor Honours Degree for the duration of the Mobility Project;
5. Between 18 and 28 years of age** at the commencement of the Mobility Project;
6. Not commenced a period of overseas study in the same Host Location as the Mobility Project prior to the Completion Date; and
7. Not previously received a short-term NCP grant.

UQ Requirement

8. Your degree program will need to have remaining space for an elective.

The group will be accompanied in Solomon Islands by Professor Kristen Lyons and Dr Peter Walters from the School of Social Science. Both have extensive experience in Solomon Islands.

Please note that while travel in the Solomon Islands is always rewarding, it can also lack many of the 'creature comforts' we are used to in Australia. You will be out of mobile communications for parts of the trip, and you will be required to share accommodation. Food is good but can be basic. Internal travel also involves flying in small aircraft and travelling in outboard canoes. You will also be required to take appropriate precautions to ensure health and wellbeing, including considering vaccinations for travel to the Pacific, as well as malaria prevention.

DFAT has provided funding for the field school of AUD3,000 per student. These funds will cover most of your expenses, including airfares and accommodation. However, there may be some additional costs you need to meet yourself. We expect these to be minimal, and will have more detail on costings early in 2020.

Submit an Expression of Interest

We are now taking expressions of interest for this activity. If you are interested, please submit a 500 word proposal by **Monday 17 February** that details why you would like to join this field trip. You might like to reflect on what you would aspire to learn through this experience, as well as any relevant background study, volunteering or other work that might support your preparedness for this educational experience. Please note, we are not looking for simply high academic achievement (that's the easy stuff)! Rather, we are looking for students who are willing to embrace the opportunity for deep learning about a close Pacific neighbour.

We also require the following details in your application:

- Age on 1 July 2020
- Gender
- Whether you identify as Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander
- Any disability that may affect your travel
- Any dietary restrictions
