# **CRIMINOLOGY – 2014**

Issues of crime and criminal justice are of central importance for contemporary social and political life. The Plan in Criminology provides a comprehensive exploration of the area from the sociological perspective. This means that crime and responses to crime, such as policing and the law, are understood to be shaped by social values, institutions and processes. In undertaking the Plan students will develop an understanding of the patterns and causes of criminality and the operations of the criminal justice system in dealing with this activity. They will also be equipped with the theoretical and methodological skills needed to collect, interpret and evaluate information about crime and criminal justice. The Plan is suitable for all students looking to gain insight into contemporary society. It will particularly appeal to students interested in careers in policing, private security and corrective services and in social policy areas related to criminal justice. Students undertaking combined Arts/Law degrees have also found the program particularly useful.
