During her time at UQ, Deanna was awarded a Scholarship from GRM International (a managing contractor of Australian aid programs) which also included an internship working in their Brisbane office. This allowed her to undertake work experience and thus build expertise and test out her prospective career path before graduating. Deanna also arranged an internship with UN-HABITAT in Kenya, for which UQ awarded her with a travel grant.

About the Program

As part of the Bachelor of Social Science, students will complete a set of core courses that equip them with theoretical knowledge, policy development and research skills that are sought after by employers.

Distinctive highlights of the program include: a final year supervised real world **research project** linked with an industry partner; and an unparalleled level of social research training. The program's engagement with government, community and commercial organisations offers unique exposure to applying social science research in the workforce.

In addition to the core courses, students undertake one or two of the following majors:

Development – offers a social science perspective on international and community development issues. Students focus on strategies to alleviate poverty and inequality, and to develop sustainable societies, communities and environments.

Environment and Society – teaches students about the relationships between environmental problems and broader social, political and economic contexts. It provides the skills required to tackle these problems through social and policy change.

Health and Society – provides an understanding of the social, cultural, economic and ethical factors influencing health and illness. Focus is placed on the way the health system works, and on gaining the skills relevant to becoming a social science worker in the health sector.

Social and Public Policy – teaches the technical skills required to analyse social and economic problems and develop, implement and evaluate policy solutions. This major connects social sciences to the world of practical politics.

Students also take courses in a elective courses from the social sciences, humanities or other fields.
