

ANTHROPOLOGY - 2019

Anthropology is the study of human life in all its diversity and richness. Anthropology employs a broad approach that also draws on other disciplines such as archaeology, human biology, linguistics and material culture studies. Anthropologists study the cultures and societies of the past few centuries, ranging from small-scale Indigenous peoples to the modern capitalist world system with all the globalising processes it has set in train. Many anthropologists conduct ethnography where they go and live with other peoples for a time in order to learn their cultures or ways of life. While performing fieldwork they might study, for example, how gender and kinship operate in social life, how language systems influence customary patterns of thought, and how indigenous peoples interact with nation states.

Anthropology can be studied as

- single and extended majors in the Bachelor of Arts or a major in the Diploma in Arts
- electives as part of the Bachelor of Social Science, or another degree program offered by UQ
